D. J. DeGolia Dies on January 12

Darwin Jack DeGolia, 63, died on Friday, January 12 at George Washington University Hospital after a heart attack. Mr. DeGolia was the Republican Precinct Chairman in Cabin John and was a member of the Cabin John Fire Board. He had always been active and interested in local affairs.

A native of California, he joined the Commerce Department after graduating from Yale University in 1927. He served as assistant trade commissioner in San Juan, Puerto Rico, and in Singapore until 1933, when he entered private business. He joined the Social Security Administration three years later and then worked for the public Health Service before joining the State Department in 1940.

Mr. DeGolia served on the Economic Defense Board and in the Office of African Affairs before he was commissioned a Foreign Service officer in 1955. He was commercial attache in San Salvador, El Salvador, until 1958, when he transferred to the Commerce Department here. He had been a part-time consultant to the National Cash Register Co. since his retirement in 1960.

Mr. DeGolia is survived by his wife, Jacqueline, who lives at 8000 Riverside Drive.

PARKWAY RAMP GETS CLOSER TO REALITY

A connecting ramp below Maryland Avenue between MacArthur Boulevard and The George Washington Parkway is on its way to becoming a reality. The 1300 foot ramp would relieve the Boulevard of the traffic that is weakening vital water conduits beneath it. It would also open to Washington commuters that stretch of parkway that ends in mud-holes just outside the District.

The National Park Service and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have tentatively approved the ramp. Approval is expected from the National Capital Planning Commission and D.C. Transit.

The construction of the ramp would at best be only a temporary solution. Eventually the parkway should link up with the Palisades Parkway in the District. Once the seven-year battle over the proposed Three Sisters Bridge is resolved, it is hoped that the "wasted" George Washington Parkway will be rapidly completed.

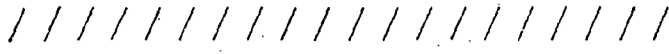

"Last fall, I made a fast trip to the States, but the haste of the trip did not give me time for me to visit with the Cabin John Citizens' Association.

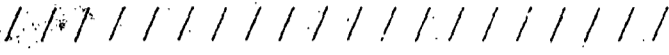
"I accept my best wishes for a happy New Year for Cabin John and its citizens."

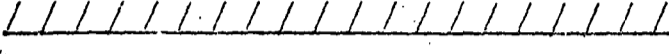

AMBULANCE ACCIDENT ON SEVEN LOCKS ROAD

Mr. Raymond L. Honey and Fred R. Rest of the Cabin John Volunteer Fire Department were recently involved in a collision between the 1965 Cadillac ambulance which belongs to the fire department and a gas truck on Seven Locks Road. Mr. Honey was injured seriously and received 30 stitches in his face. Mr. Rest, who was driving the ambulance at the time, escaped uninjured.

The Cabin John Volunteer Fire Department has borrowed an ambulance from the Chevy Chase Rescue Squad until ours is fixed. Emergency service has continued normally despite the accident.

This is just one more illustration of the hazards involved driving on Seven Locks Road in its present condition.

We expect our costs to go up considerably this year. The cost of postage in 1967 was held down because the Citizens' Association paid for most of it. This year we will try to handle all of this ourselves despite rising postal rates.

Distribution will also go up. We recently hired Hank Hook at the rate of \$5.00 per month to see that the newsletter gets to every home in Cabin John. The volunteer method we used at the beginning of last year was cumbersome and relied too heavily on the same people month after month. If we cannot meet this expense in the coming months, we shall be forced to stop free delivery.
