AT GREAT FALLS PARK

On May 17, there will be a C&O Canal Wildflower Walk. Between the Potomac River and the Canal towpath, familiar and rare specimens of wildflowers provide a carpet of beauty. Betty Henson, volunteer in the park, will show you where to look. To join this two hour walk, meet at the C&O Canal Tavern Museum at 10 a.m.

MORE ON THE BRIDGE

A final contract has been let by the Army Corps of Engineers for repairs on the bridge which are necessary to reopen Cabin John Parkway which runs below it. The repairs, estimated at \$80,000 are being financed by the State of Maryland.

A snag in beginning repairs occurred when the Advisory Council on Historical Preservation advised the Army Corps of Engineers that before repair work could begin, a stone conservator would have to be contracted with to insure historical preservation of the bridge during repair. Construction has begun and will take about 30 days. The work involves removal of capstones on the bridge above the parkway to avoid any more falling rocks on the parkway. The bridge will be closed to pedestrian and bicycle traffic during construction for safety reasons.

As for reopening the bridge, the best information we have now is that after funds are appropriated, construction will take 9 to 10 months. The appropriation of funds, however, could be anywhere between 6 weeks and 6 months off.

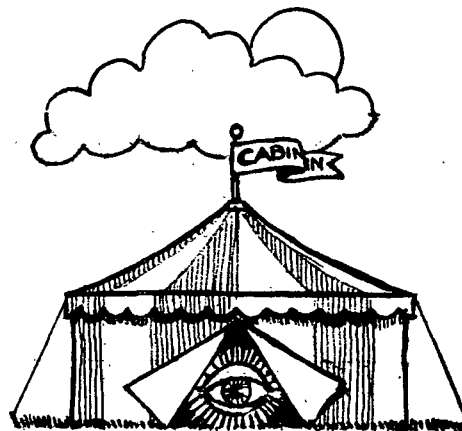

CLARA BARTON USAGE

The relocation of the Post Office to the Clara Barton building at last telling was waiting for the Montgomery County Public School system to check into the Post Office Department's doing their own renovation. This has been okayed and now the zoning commission must pass on allowing the post office to relocate at Clara Barton. A resolution is being prepared to allow the superintendent to enter into an agreement with the Post Office to lease space at Clara Barton. After that, the Post Office will begin to let out contracts for renovations of the primary unit.

Merit Thorson of the County Human Resources Office, suggested the possibility of some kind of luncheon program for Senior Citizens based in the kitchen at Clara Barton. Other centers around the county serve lunches for a very nominal fee and offer the participants a chance to socialize and occasionally enjoy some entertainment. If you think this would serve some of our citizens, please call Diane Kellogg at 229-8163.

Room 1 has been selected as a combination Senior Citizens and Student Resource Room. Furniture and resource materials are being collected, including encyclopedias, dictionaries, atlases, magazines, text books, rugs, a long table and a coffee pot. When this room is equipped, it will serve as a meeting place during the day for senior citizens and will be open one or two nights per week for students who need resource material and can't get to a library. If anyone has a contribution, suggestion or wishes to volunteer to help students during the resource evenings they should call Fran Wilson after 6 p.m. at 229-3385.

Any decision on housing Day Care facilities at Clara Barton still awaits a policy decision by the Board of Education on housing Day Care facilities in public schools. A letter will go to the Board of Education from the Citizens Association urging action on this policy.

Montgomery County Public Schools is looking for a building maintenance man for the evenings

at Clara Barton, Monday through Friday. This will make the building more accessible to community use, perhaps even enabling the establishment of a once a week teen center, depending on adult commitment from the community. If you support this, please make your voice heard.

HIGHLIGHTS OF APRIL CITIZENS ASSOCIATION MEETING

At the Cabin John Citizens Association meeting on April 22, it was revealed that the letter regarding the repair of the Union Arch Bridge from the Association to public officials has been sent. Senator Mathias was one of the first respondents and he explained that it will be at least 18 months before the bridge reconstruction will be completed, due to the complexities of territorial authority over and responsibility for the bridge.

The layout of the park planned for the 10 acre tract near Palisades Pool will be presented to the Citizens Association in late May or early June.

There was \$800 left over in county funds allocated for Cabin John. After discussion of several possible uses for the money (which included purchase of a bubble bus stop, or daffodils to be planted in Cabin John) it was decided that the money would be returned to the County as a gesture of good faith that county efforts toward repair of the Union Arch Bridge would be timely and swift.

Discussion on the downzoning controversy continued with a statement by Becky Wilner which made clear the desire of the Wilners and Wiesners regarding the zoning of their commercial pro-

erties. At the present time, position papers both for and against downzoning are being prepared for distribution to every resident in Cabin John. After circulation of these papers, it is hoped that another Town Meeting will be held to resolve the controversy by reassessing the zoning situation as presented in the CABIN JOHN COMMUNITY PLAN. A vote on commercial zoning will be taken at that meeting which will reflect the citizen concern for the commercial establishments in our community, and at the same time, a process by which the community can amend or endorse decisions, policies or directions as presented in the PLAN, can be established.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

This letter is to you, as Editor of the VILLAGE NEWS.

As a citizen of Cabin John for the past several years, and one who believes in this community, and wants to see it pull together and work together, I would like to briefly state my reactions to the last (April 1975) issue of the 'VILLAGE NEWS.'

1. The calendar, with local and area events, which has in the past been on the front page, was not included in this issue. I regret it.

2. There was an article signed by an Ombudsman. Such a person is one I would expect to be able to contact, and who, through election or appointment, has been given authority to fill that role; I have no knowledge of this having happened. Is there an explanation, and how might I contact this person?

3. The name change of the paper from 'Cabin John Village News' to 'The Village News' (Serving the People of Cabin John and Beyond) is significant in that I believe that the first order of business is Cabin John News, and I have heard from three sources that an article specifically relating to our town -- developments for the Clara Barton School -- was not printed while there were six (of 13) articles not directly relating to news of our town and its people. This bothers me.

4. I was out of town during the Citizens Association Meeting and thus do not know what those who were there know. I find the reporting of that meeting disturbing for these reasons: (1) It is unsigned, yet personal judgments were made as to what information to include and what to exclude. I strongly believe that this article should have been signed. (2) The men who were quoted were all identified by name; the women were not. I believe that everyone, or no one, should be identified in such an article.

In conclusion, I want to support a paper in Cabin John which is by our people, and for our people, which reports happenings in our town, which is unbiased in its reporting, which identifies editorials

and authorship, and which helps us all to work together for a better community.

A great deal has been accomplished by the people of the Cabin John Citizens Association. Their efforts have been tremendous and

the fruit of their endeavors is abundant. The zoning issue is the first real conflict concerning the decisions made by the Citizens Association and the people-at-large who attended the town meetings held to approve the CABIN JOHN COMMUNITY PLAN. The controversy over 'downzoning' is a serious challenge to the copious work that has already been done. If THE VILLAGE NEWS has appeared biased on this issue, it is only because there was no response to the challenging letters and articles appearing herein. Had there been a response, another side available for us to print, we would have done so gladly. While I maintain editorial privilege as *pro bono* editor, I will never deny anyone space to respond. The 'downzoning' issue demands the scrutiny of us all.

THE VILLAGE NEWS is one of the most valuable tools for democracy in Cabin John, if only by virtue of the fact that it is the one thing that everybody in this community reads. We have made mistakes and, no doubt, will continue to do so. I like to think that we, as citizens, will not shrink from controversies, but rather, welcome them and through human cooperation and communication, resolve them.

May THE VILLAGE NEWS be more than just a bulletin board. May it arouse citizen interest and participation. May it broaden our awareness, perception, and appreciation of the eclectic lifestyles we share, living along the Potomac. May it be the voice of individuals as well as of the community, and may it always disseminate accurate information to the greater increase of our collective knowledge.

Cabin John deserves the most informative, pleasurable, public interest oriented VILLAGE NEWS it can get. We will try, with a little help from our friends and neighbors, to give it to you.

LAWN MAINTENANCE & CARE

I have lived in Cabin John for 21 years, my husband and some of my friends have lived here all their lives, and their parents and grandparents before the. In all these years, these people have managed to keep Cabin John a small, friendly community with very little commercial activity along MacArthur Boulevard. When I first moved here, there were three grocery stores, a soda fountain, a barber shop and a restaurant. These few pieces of property have always been zoned commercial, and in 21 years no thing new has been added in the line of commercial property. This is not because of a few new people who have moved here in the last few years and decided to take Cabin John over, but because of the people who have always rejected any more commercial enterprises in Cabin John, and there have been many who have wanted to build along this main road of ours. The Army Corps of Engineers has always jealously guarded the road, not allowing anything new to be built. The citizens have also been on guard about any more commercial property, we have always liked and been satisfied with what we have, and I for one do not want to have to go all the way to Bethesda, Potomac or even Glen Echo when I discover at 4:30 that I don't have bread or milk for dinner which will be ready at 5:00.

I did not read the three pound book that was left at my house explaining the downzoning. My fault, I did not attend the Town Meeting where I am told 200 people voted to pass this plan. But I can guarantee you, I will no longer sit by and watch all these things happen without putting up a fight.

As the zoning stands now, the Quick Food Shop and Artisan Art Gallery can in no way improve the outside of their property. They can't even paint it. If it should be damaged in any way, whether by fire, or vandals, or a truck running into it, it can not be repaired. It must operate in that condition or be torn down and sold as residential property, after these own-

ers have paid a commercial price for it. Can you honestly say that is fair or just. We already have zoning to protect us if these people tried to expand or add on to their present locations. So if you are truly interested in your community and your homes, and you could be the next one to be told you can't improve your property, then please attend the next Citizens Association Meeting and the Town Meeting and make your voice heard and your vote count. You will be reading and hearing alot about this in the next few weeks; read and listen to both sides and then come to the meeting and vote. I for one do not want my friend's and neighbors run out of business. In closing, I would like to know why the Touhey Tract and Alpine Veterinary were both excluded from this downzoning. Does this mean that you can paint and improve your home but I better not touch mine?

PETITION

As citizens of Cabin John, we protest the change in zoning of the property at 7607 MacArthur Boulevard (parcel 9) known as the 'Quick Food Shop' and the property at 7687 MacArthur Boulevard (parcel 5) known as the 'Artisans Gallery,' from C-1 to R-90. We are of the opinion that:

- 1. The current use of both properties has been both reasonable and beneficial to the community.*
- 2. There is no mistake in the original zoning of these properties and that no substantial change in the character of the neighborhood has occurred to warrant rezoning action.*
- 3. These parcels continue to be economically viable, and the scale of their operations is harmonious with the neighborhood and in keeping with the purpose of a convenience commercial zone.*

We, the undersigned, being 18 years of age or older, and residents of Cabin John hereby

petition the Montgomery County Council to restore parcel 5 and parcel 9 to their C-1 status forthwith.

Committee Members and All Concerned Citizens:

The copy of our petition to the Circuit Court of Montgomery County (see above) explains our position in the downzoning of our property at Tomlinson Avenue and MacArthur Boulevard in legal terms. I would like to review the situation in my own words as I see it.

In 1964 we were interested in finding a location for a small grocery and restaurant business. In February of that year, Mr. Lee Dickinson advertised his business and property at Tomlinson and MacArthur for sale. He had operated a grocery store there for the previous fifteen years and wished to retire. The building had been built in 1920 and the property zoned commercial in 1928. . . and had housed a grocery business during its entire existence. I might add, on a personal note, that I worked there myself in the early 1930's as a relief clerk when the Sanitary Grocery Company, now a part of Safeway, occupied that building.

The neighborhood, the location and the size of the property ideally suited our plans for a small neighborhood business. In addition, we felt that Cabin John really had a need for the services we intended to provide. We bought the property and proceeded immediately to completely remodel the building and install all new equipment at considerable expense (an in 1964 dollars, I might add!). The community response was overwhelming and enthusiastic. Our venture was a success on both a business level and a community project.

Ten years passed, during which time we sold the Quick Food Shop operation to Mr. William Castle, my brother-in-law and employee for twenty years. In 1970 the BETHESDA-CHEVY CHASE MASTER PLAN was adopted retaining commercial zoning at this corner. In October of 1974 I left town for three weeks and returned. continued on page 6



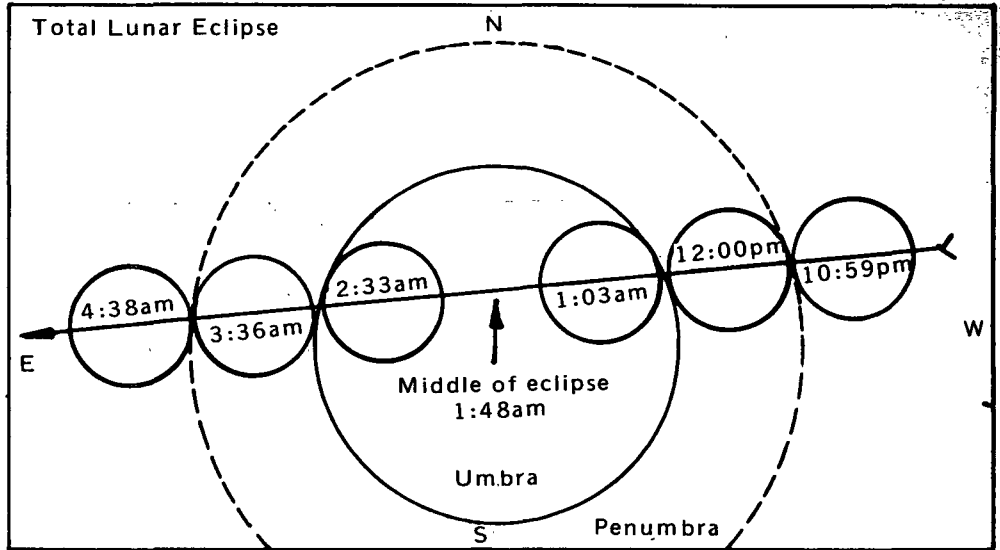

TOTAL LUNAR ECLIPSE!

May the Bird of Paradise peck a hole in your volleyball if you miss the total lunar eclipse on the night of May 24-25. If the skies are clear, it should be extensively observed owing to the favourable combination of a weekend night, comfortable springtime temperatures, and visibility from coast to coast. A pair of 7X binoculars may add to the excitement, or better yet, a small telescope using the lowest power eyepiece. The naked eye, however, should be quite sufficient.

On the evening of Saturday, May 24 at 10:59 p.m., the moon will begin entering the earth's *penumbra*, a secondary shadow cast by our planet into space, and gradually wax into totality beginning at 1:03 a.m. Sunday. Mid-eclipse is at 1:48 a.m. At this moment, the earth will be exactly between the sun and moon, throwing its shadow on the latter. Totality will last between the hours of 1:03 a.m. and 2:33 a.m. and the entire event will be Cosmic History at 4:38 a.m. Sunday, May 25.

Moreover, the beginning or ending of a lunar eclipse happens simultaneously for every viewer, unlike a solar eclipse. Hence the simple following schedule holds for all places.



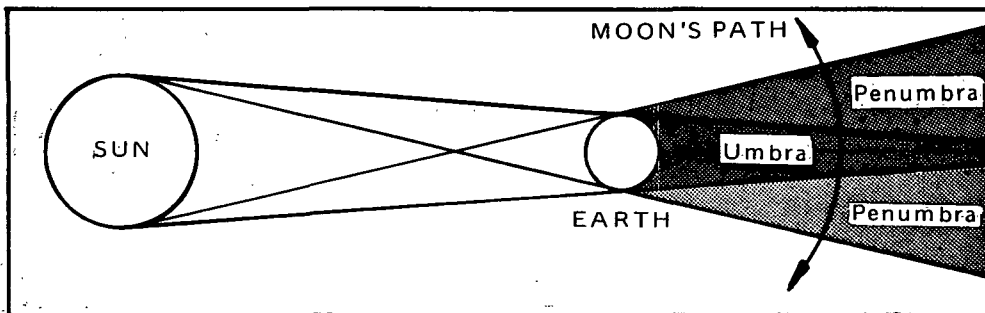
The moon's passage through the earth's shadow on the night of May 24-25.

Moon enters penumbra	10:59pm
Moon enters umbra	12:00pm
Totality begins	1:03am
Middle of eclipse	1:48am
Totality ends	2:33am
Moon leaves umbra	3:36am
Moon leaves penumbra	4:38am

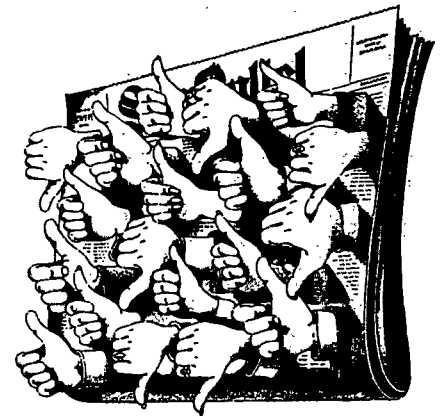
All times given are Eastern Daylight Savings Time.

Although solar eclipses occur more often, one stands a better chance of seeing lunar ones because total solar eclipses are visible only along the relatively narrow strip on our globe where the moon's shadow falls. A lunar eclipse on the other hand is visible over the whole half of the earth which is turned toward the moon at that time. (See illustration)

Here's a chance to witness an event which terribly upset our forebears who knew little of the causes involved. This will be the first total lunar eclipse available to us in three long years and the only one over Cabin John this year. It should be quite a spectacle. Don't miss it!

This recipe for Chicken Diable comes to us from Brenda Titus. She got the recipe from a Home Economics Teachers Cookbook, and she says it is easy and quite good.

- 1 3-lb. broiler-fryer, cut up
- 4 teaspoons butter
- ½ cup honey
- ¼ cup prepared mustard
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon curry powder

Remove skin from chicken. Melt butter in shallow baking pan. Stir in remaining ingredients. Roll chicken pieces in butter mixture to coat both sides and arrange meaty side up in a single layer in the same pan. Baste once during baking time. Bake at 375° for one hour. Serves 4
