500 RESIDENTS PACK COUNCIL MEETING TO PROTEST LANDFILL SITES

About 500 Montgomery County residents packed the Rockville High School auditorium early this month to protest the three proposed sites for a new county landfill.

Representatives of the Greater Laytonsville Civic Association, the Potomac Committee to Save our Land, the Elney Mill Civic Association, and the West Montgomery Citizens Association registered their protest before the Council members in an open hearing.

Council members were urged to consider a new technology which would dispense with the need for landfills in the future. Led by the Potomac group, citizens urged that a resource-recovery plant be built which would separate metals, glass and other recoverable materials from trash that could then be burned as a fuel material.

Charles Allmen of the Potomac Committee, told the Council that technology for the resource-recovery plant is "now so reliable that a back-up dump is not needed."

Other groups recommend that the present Gude-Southlawn landfill be expanded since the necessary roads, zoning and community impact are already a fact at that site.

At the end of the session, Council member, John Menke said he hoped the Council could quickly pursue development of a resource recovery plant. "I think it's obscene that we have to have landfills in this day of technology," he said.

The county is now ready to talk to private owners and operators of resource-recovery plants, said Andrea Weirich, county planner in charge of landfill sites. Weirich said the county has always been

interested in resource-recovery but only in the last few months have they decided to contact private firms for details. She added that a staff person will soon be hired to coordinate taking bids from companies.

Whether the county's interest can be fanned to quickly proceed with hiring staff and pursuing development of a resource-recovery plant and thus avoid landfills in Potomac or the other two proposed sites probably depends upon the degree of citizen pressure.

MATHIAS INTRODUCES NOISE POLLUTION BILL FOR DULLES AND NATIONAL AIRPORT FLIGHT PATHS

This month, Senator Charles McC Mathias introduced a bill which directs the FAA to develop and implement a comprehensive noise abatement program for the two airports. Under the Mathias bill, the FAA will have to take steps to to reduce noise during aircraft takeoff and landings and reduce incompatible land use adjacent to the airports.

Mathias noted that aircraft noise because of its sustained nature, causes health problems and structural damage to buildings. His bill would require the FAA to implement an Aviation Noise Abatement Policy which
