### COG FINALLY MOVES ON AIRPORT NOISE

After public hearings, which included testimony on behalf of Cabin John residents by Allen Van Emerick, the Council of Governments has made their recommendations to FAA. These were: that the passenger load at National Airport be cutback to 14 million passengers a year from its present 15 million level. (It rose by 2 million in the last year alone.); that the 650 mile non-stop flight distance be maintained: that the 7 grandfather cities that are now exempt from the 650 mile limit be dropped; that the curfew on flights be moved up from 10:00 p.m. to 9:30.

The COG staff will do more extensive study on the scatter plans before voting on a recommendation to FAA on June 11.

The FAA won't start making adjustments until the end of April to their proposals for National Airport and the scatter plan. Their plans must be finalized by August 15, by court order and must be implemented by January 1, 1981. If the public is not satisfied with their actions, then our only recourse seems to take them to court and make them listen to our concerns.

Two years ago, the citizens made the same recommendations to the FAA, but they paid little heed. They seem to be playing their usual politics instead of responding to the desires of communities impacted by Nat'l. Airport. Hopefully enough angry testimony was given this time to make them listen and take the appropriate action.



EXCERPTS FROM CITIZEN'S ASSOC. LETTER TO MONTGOMERY COUNTY PLANNING BOARD DIRECTOR ROYCE HANSON, BY ALLEN VAN EMMERIK Re: MACARTHUR SQUARE

.. MacArthur Square was not designed with Cabin John in mind. The ... proposal is out of scale not just a little, or within any reasonable scale range, but three or four times as large as it should be... Cabin John does not oppose commercial development of the site in question. But we do categorically oppose development in which we have no voice. The piecemeal fashion in which this project is proceeding will countenance major development at the heart of Cabin John, outstripping our ability to be heard in our own defense on the merits of development as a whole.

Cabin John does not oppose commercial development on the tract in question, providing it is in keeping with the scale and character of Cabin John. We are willing to work toge-ther with the developer and the County toward an alternative accommodating the needs of all three. But the Community has been canvassed thoroughly on this plan, and I have no hesitation in saying that no one favors the scope of this plan. (4/4/80)
