

# Historic Cabin John Church Devastated by Ash Wednesday Fire CJCA to Coordinate Community Response

The historic landmark Gibson Grove Church on Seven Locks Road was ravaged by fire on February 25, Ash Wednesday. The once stately white church with its tall spire atop the hill on Seven Locks Road is now shrouded in a blue tarp billowing in the wind with a damaged front entry and boarded up windows. This church represents the heritage of Cabin John's Gibson Grove community which itself dates back to land sales to black farm workers in the 1880s. Sarah Gibson, for whom the community and church were named, was a former slave who donated part of her land for a church, school, and cemetery.

The Gibson Grove church was organized on the present site in 1898 as an affiliate of the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Zion Church. The AME Zion denomination itself was formed in the early 1880s in response to discrimination experienced by black members of a white Methodist congregation in New York City. Gibson Grove AME Zion Church was first housed in a log structure; the current white gabled church structure was built in 1921. For generations, members of the Gibson Grove AME Zion Church lived, worked and worshipped in Cabin John. When citizens of Cabin John came together to try to improve relations, it was members of the Gibson Grove community who helped organize and run the first Cabin John Crab Feast. In recent years as members of the Gibson Grove community passed away or moved to other locations, the number of active parishioners at Gibson Grove dwindled.

Last year, the AME Zion Conference gave the house of worship to the First Agape AME Zion Church whose members live throughout the metropolitan DC area. Under the leadership of pastor Rev. Edgar Bankhead, they had been working aggressively to repair and restore the historic church. Before the fire struck, completed renovations included a new roof, new floors, carpets, walls, new steps, lighting, and a new coat of paint on the exterior. The destruction caused by the fire was extensive and most of the renovation work was damaged or destroyed. Preliminary inspection of the fire damage showed gaping holes in the roof, exposed beams, blown out windows, damaged carpet and floors, toppled pews, and a toppled church organ.

Lou Varella, Chairman of the Board of Trustees for the First Agape AME Zion Church Gibson Grove, is heading up the efforts to assess the damage and plan for restoration. Because of the church's landmark status, cleanup and restoration efforts will have to wait until the historic preservation council completes

an inspection. The congregation hopes that plans they had for further renovations, such as a parking lot and handicap access, can be incorporated into the restoration activity. We have been told that parishioners are determined to rebuild so that Gibson Grove can once again house their active congregation. In the meantime, the congregation plans to continue holding services in Cabin John for the foreseeable future and for the near term will be at the Clara Barton Center on Sundays.

With over \$500,000 in damage and only \$100,000 in insurance, the church will have its work cut out for it as it begins rebuilding. CJCA is working to coordinate volunteer efforts and donations from Cabin John and surrounding communities. Burr Gray, president of the CJCA, recruited local resident Angela Coppola to serve as focal point for this effort. CJCA will gather and record contributions and present them to the pastor, Rev. Bankhead or to Mr. Varella who is serving as our point of contact. The first set of donations, which totaled close to \$1,000, was presented on March 7. Mr. Varella and Rev. Bankhead expressed their sincere thanks to everyone who has asked how they might help in providing cleanup and construction assistance, donating building materials, or suggesting ideas for fund raisers.

**Next CJCA Meeting Agenda** — Presentation of MacArthur Plaza Parking Survey and vote on proposal to improve the parking system and increase the number of parking spots at the shopping center.

**Summary of Results of CJCA Meeting of Feb 24, 2004** — 1) *Gibson Grove Cemetery* – Diane Leatherman provided a briefing on her latest efforts to enlist the County’s support to preserve the cemetery and to improve the access to it. The response back from the County is that such activity is not a county matter. Attendees voted to have CJCA apply for a historic preservation grant, if such grants are available this year, to assist with the restoration. 2) *Quarry Development* – Attendees listened to a presentation by Kirsten Emigholtz (FOCJCW) on the two developments being proposed for the two quarries on River Road. The quarry planned for the location just west of the Firehouse will have approximately 90 5-story condominiums. The development planned for the Giancola Quarry will have approximately 30 single family houses. The attendees voted to have CJCA prepare comments on both developments. (CJCA representatives were scheduled to meet with the Giancola Quarry developers to discuss their concerns on March 12.) 3) *Captain’s Market* – attendees voted to pay for one half of the cost of the \$800 fee paid by Elliott Gitlin to the County in order for the Board of Appeals to hear the case filed by Mr. Gitlin, and supported by CJCA, for a review of the permit granted for the expansion of the Captain’s Market. (At the subsequent hearing on Feb 25, 2004, the Board of Appeals ruled that they had no jurisdiction to hear the case since the appeal was filed after the 30-day appeal period following the issuance of the permit last summer. The Board also

stated that there is no requirement that a commercial building permit be posted.)

**April 3 Potomac River/ C&O Canal Cleanup at Lock 8 Lockhouse** — The Potomac Conservancy, in conjunction with the Alice Ferguson Foundation, will be cleaning up the Potomac River on April 3 (9 am – 12 noon) at certain local sites. The Cabin John Citizens Association has traditionally taken on

the task of cleaning the section between Lockhouse 8 and the Beltway, so we need some volunteers, including those with canoes and boats. Even if you don’t find much trash, a good canoe ride is worthwhile. Some folk used their time to clean up areas along the Canal as well. There is always good hunting where the Beltway crosses over the River/ Canal. If you are interested, meet at Lockhouse 8 at 9 am on April 3 (a Saturday). Gloves & refreshments will be provided, but bring your own gloves if you have them. If you have any questions, you can contact Burr Gray (burr.gray@alum.dartmouth.org or 703-607-2740). Unless it is really raining hard, the cleanup is likely to proceed.

**Friends of Cabin John Creek Watershed Activities In April** — Just a heads up that the Friends of Cabin John Creek Watershed (FOCJCW) has several events planned at the mid-to-end of April to highlight our lovely Cabin John Creek. The quarterly water quality monitoring will take place on April 17-18 (9:30 – 11:30 am at various locations along the Creek) – contact local CJ resident Roy Seidenstein (focjcw@earthlink.net) if you would like to get involved in the water sampling effort. The annual spring Creek Cleanup, in coordination with the Cabin John Citizens Assn., is scheduled for April 24 (9:30 – 12 noon). **Accident on the Clara Barton Parkway** — As many of you may know, long-time Cabin John resident Dan Sullivan, died after being hit by a car as he crossed over the Clara Barton Parkway at the foot of 79th St with his two dogs. Dan was hit in the westbound lanes as he was crossing back into Cabin John. It should be noted that the eastbound lanes pose a greater danger since cars traveling east from Potomac or the Beltway come up a slight rise and go into a slight turn so that they do not have an extensive direct line of vision on what might be in the road in front of them. Whatever side, the cars are moving quickly. If you are used to crossing the Parkway at the foot of 79<sup>th</sup> Street, please be very careful. You always have the option of going under the Parkway just 100 yards further down the street.

The Park Service has offered to meet with the Citizens Association to discuss the accident.

# Relevant Information for March 23 CJCA Discussion/Vote On MacArthur Plaza Shopping Center Parking

## The Current Situation

In 2000, the Market on the Blvd requested support from the Cabin John Citizens Association (CJCA) for additional parking. The County is unlikely to support additional parking absent support from the community. The proposal was to add 11 spots along the eastern side (along Seven Locks Rd) of the lot below the Bethesda Co-op (a portion of which is now covered with wood chips), two spots in front of the old BB&T location (area now covered with wood chips), and one spot in the northwest corner of the upper parking lot. A Parking Committee was formed to review this issue. At the May 2003 meeting of the CJCA, the Parking Committee was asked to investigate the following issues to more fully understand the request and impact of adding more parking spaces.

1. **Occupancy protection (density restrictions).** This language would run with the Shopping Center property and is designed to keep entities from coming in who would not have been eligible absent the new parking spaces. The language will be developed if an agreement is reached between CJCA and Garrett & Smith (G&S).
2. **What do other spaces trigger?** G & S would put in two van-accessible spaces next to the Co-op to address any disability requirements triggered by extra spaces.
3. **Parking survey.** The idea was to more fully understand who parks where and for how long? A presentation of the findings of the Parking Survey will be made at the meeting. The highlights are listed below.
4. **Have an overall accurate map.** An accurate map showing the shopping center and the proposed spaces will be available at the meeting.
5. **Parking in the Chinese-American Church lot on 78th street.** The church is willing to lease for a fee parking spots in its lot to Shopping Center employees if desired.
6. **Parking underneath the Co-op.** There are 12 spaces available for cars. These spaces are filled most of the time.
7. **Was there an agreement between CJCA and G&S 14 years ago regarding the new construction/parking?** No one has found any written agreement. The G&S agreement with the County is the approved site plan.
8. **Quantify impact to business.** What is benefit to community? As an example of benefits to the business, a consultant hired by the Bethesda Co-op

stated several years ago that in general, a food store needs 8 parking spaces for each 1000 sq ft of sales area. Thus, the Co-op (with 4000 sq ft sq) could use an additional 10 spaces beyond the 24 currently near the store. The benefit to the community is clearly that less time is spent by customers looking for a parking spot, and hopefully there are fewer customers parking on side streets.

9. **Safety issues regarding exit onto Seven Locks Road.** G&S will work to lengthen the line of sight from the exit so that exiting customers can see oncoming cars sooner. G&S will work with the County to improve the signage currently seen as drivers approach the exit from Seven Locks Road.
10. **Option of parking availability at Firehouse parking lot.** G&S believe that use of some of those parking spots by Post Office will probably continue.
11. **How to use better the parking spaces that currently exist.** G&S will require that retail employees park only in the spots that are the so-called "tandem-hedge" spots—i.e., those spots in the tandem slots next to the hedge that that can be blocked by cars pulling in from behind. This was



the only way to ensure maximum use of those spots. Retail customers will be able to pull in behind those cars.

12. **Civic benefit from G&S.** Are there improvements that could be made in general to the Shopping Center; for example, make picnic area better. Other expenses associated with a possible CJCA/G&S agreement (increasing safety/line of sight at Seven Locks exit, installing retaining wall/berm/landscaping at parking spaces, rain garden below Co-op, etc.) are significant. G&S cannot agree to additional costs at this time but is willing to revisit issue at a later date.

13. **Light minimization.** G&S will ensure that adequate landscaping exists to prevent car headlights from shining into neighbors' homes from new parking spots. Current overhead lights will stay in same location.

**Findings of Parking Committee**

Tenants and customers agree that there is inadequate parking. Main parking problem is the 11 am – 2 pm lunch hour period. Addition of new business (My Sushi) will bring in additional lunch hour customers. Elimination of Post Office on Seven Locks Road increased customers at Cabin John Post Office.

130 parking spaces total at Shopping Center, 17 spaces of which are located under the Co-op building and are allotted and used by employees of the Shopping Center businesses. Five of the 17 spaces were converted to Co-op storage facilities. Current proposal deals with adding an additional 14 spaces total, in three different locations.

Drivers cut through from Seven Locks entrance when traffic is backed up during rush hour. This is hazardous.

Past use of tandem parking spots has not been maximized.

**Results of Parking Survey**

A survey was conducted in fall 2003 to learn concerns of the shopping center tenants, how many of their employees required parking, and where they parked. The full results of the survey will be presented at the March 23 CJCA meeting, including a copy of the questionnaire and full results (without identification of the tenants). There are photos taken during the busy lunch hour to show where parking is tight, where there is congestion, and

where there are always empty spaces. Three main results from the data collected stand out:

- (a) Tenant profile: All tenants were surveyed. 16 have walk-in clients; 4 have clients "by appointment only"; and 4 are retail establishments.
- (b) Most tenants' hours of operation, during the weekdays, are from 9 am to 6 pm. Weekend parking is not a concern.
- (c) Over half of the parking is taken up by the tenants' employees. The 16 "walk in" establishments require 61 parking spaces for their employees; the 4 retail establishments require 39 parking spaces for their employees, and the 4 "by appointment only" establishments require 8 parking spaces. These figures assume that all employees drive and it should be noted that some of the employees park on side streets.

**Elements of Parking Proposal**

Having spent a considerable amount of time investigating the issue, the Parking Committee will submit a proposal at the March 23 meeting which consists of the following:

A. Immediate implementation by G&S of a system to (1) eliminate use of customer spots by retail employees (Bethesda Co-op, Post Office, Pizza Hut, Market on the Blvd, My Sushi), and (2) maximize use of hedge-tandem parking spots by retail merchants.

- No retail employee parking allowed in customer spots before 3 pm weekdays.

- Hedge-tandem spot spaces must always be occupied unless blocked by customer.

- All retail employees must display parking permit at all times, even if parking on side streets.

- Parking signs will be installed noting (1) hedge-tandem spots are only for retail employees, (2) any parking in designated retail customer spots is of limited duration.

- G&S will conduct twice weekly inspections during 60 days following implementation to determine that the parking system is being effectively implemented and complied with, and will report results monthly in writing to the CJCA Parking Committee. Garrett & Smith will take necessary measures to ensure future and long term compliance with the parking system. In the event of a sale of the MacArthur Plaza Shopping Center, Garrett & Smith will explain to the new owner the advantages of the parking system, the importance of the issue to CJCA, and the need for effective enforcement of the parking system and the monitoring requirements.

B. If the parking system is deemed effectively implemented by a majority of the CJCA Parking Committee, as of 60 days after such system is commenced, CJCA support of G&S's request to the County for additional parking follows automatically. Specifically, CJCA would support adding: (1) 11 additional parking spots below the Co-op currently partly covered by wood chips (the resulting aisle space would be approximately the same width as that in front of the lower lot retailers), (2) two additional spots (now covered with wood chips) in front of the old BB&T Bank location, and (3) one additional spot in northwest corner of back lot. Garrett & Smith may file a request at any time for a County hearing date regarding the additional parking, provided such hearing date is more than 60 days after commencement of the parking system. This will allow for the final determination by the CJCA Parking Committee as noted above.

C. In return for CJCA support of the additional parking spaces, Garrett & Smith would agree to the following:

- A legal prohibition running with the land/Shopping Center that keeps entities from moving into the Shopping Center that would not have been eligible before addition of the new spaces.

- Addition of van-accessible handicap parking spots – creation of two van accessible spaces just downhill from the Bethesda Co-op.

- Rain Garden installed downhill of new Co-op spaces. CJCA will apply for grants for a rain garden to be created in the area between the Co-op parking lot and MacArthur Blvd. If a grant is not available, then Garrett & Smith will provide funding. (CJCA agrees to initiate discussions with County and make a formal request to County to improve drainage along MacArthur Blvd.) This project is contingent on approval by the Army Corps of Engineers since they own the property.

- Improvement of the exit onto Seven Locks Road by lowering sight-blocking area uphill, so as to allow persons exiting a longer line of sight to see oncoming cars.

- Light minimization – G&S to install landscaping along new spaces below Co-op so as to prevent glare from headlights into neighboring houses. The current overhead lights will remain in their current location.

- Renting parking spaces – G&S will talk to Firehouse lot owners and arrange for Post Office employees parking there if possible.

- G&S will consider rental of spaces from Chinese-American Church on 77<sup>th</sup> Street if parking on side streets next to Shopping Center becomes too burdensome to residents, and if retail employees would use the church parking lot.

- The deteriorating concrete at the bottom edge of the parking lot along Seven Locks Road will be replaced and the area landscaped as feasible.

**Benefits of Proposal**

There will be more parking for retail customers, thus benefiting both the local merchants and those residents/customers who need to do their business during the peak hours. The increased business will assist our local businesses who are generally not national in scope and are an important part of the Cabin John community.

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## Looking Back in Cabin John

### Cabin John A Generation Ago

Once a year I like to look back at life in Cabin John a generation ago, drawing on the files of the *Village News* as well as my own memories. So what was life like in our town in 1974?

Lots of things we now take for granted didn't exist then. There was no shopping center. On its site stood an old white frame structure, previously known as Tuohey's Tavern and later as the Valley Inn. It had originally housed a general store as well as the first Cabin John Post Office when it was established in the 1880's. But by 1974 the building stood vacant and vandalized, a hang-out for unruly juveniles. Condemned by the County, it was razed by the Cabin John Fire Department in the spring. The Fire Department, now on River Road, was in fact right next door then, in its original 1919 building. Its siren was a well-known sound in Cabin John when it sounded to summon volunteers. And the Fire Department's baseball team was a source of community pride.

The area south of MacArthur Boulevard, where the MacArthur Park development now stands, was then vacant land, known as the Pollinger tract, and was the subject of extensive litigation as to its use. In 1974 the Maryland Court of Appeals (Maryland's highest court) had just vacated, on procedural grounds, a special zoning exception by the County that would have permitted a high rise structure to be erected — a proposal that the community generally had vigorously opposed.

The biggest news of the year was the closing of Clara Barton Elementary School. By 1974 it had become the smallest school in the County system and, although a survey of community

views by the Cabin John Citizens Association showed that most Cabin Johners would like to keep it open, the Board of Education decided to close it both because its cost per student was well above the County average and because it was difficult in a small school to provide the variety of educational experiences that Cabin John's diverse school population needed.

A CJCA committee immediately began considering how the building could best be used, but it took many years (and several interim uses, including the Cabin John Post Office with the then existing 20731 zip code) before today's Community Center was well established. In 1974 there was, however, an existing recreation center near the tennis courts (some years later it burned down) and this building was used for community purposes, such as a Cabin John "Open House" held on Saturday afternoon, April 21, 1974, to which newcomers were particularly invited and which featured speakers on Cabin John's history.

In 1974 the Union Arch bridge accommodated two-way automobile traffic! There were no traffic lights controlling access, and cars moved — very slowly — in both directions simultaneously. No separate path existed for bikers or pedestrians, and walking across the bridge was a pretty hazardous undertaking.

Recycling was just getting under way, and today's familiar blue boxes were a thing of the future. Newspapers had to be taken to Bannockburn School or a shopping center for recycling, and the other recyclables were accepted only at the Rockville recycling area.

The *Village News* had only five regular advertisers, all of them local businesses — Dorothy Helen's Beauty Salon, Ed Clark Hauling, Emil Dolezal Plumbing, Vera Dolezal Piano and Violin Studio, and the Quick Food Shop (today's Captain's Market) — and many issues of the paper carried recipes for cakes, cookies and other delicacies, submitted by local residents.

Cabin John has changed since then — as has the world — but one thing is still very much a part of life here — our community spirit. Let's keep it going for another generation!


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
