As you may know, the Montgomery County Department of Public Works and Transportation’s Engineering Division is working on a preliminary design for creating safer and more user-friendly

(Phase II) to be behind schedule. The County will schedule a public meeting for late spring or early summer. It is estimated that 35% of the design will be completed and presented for funding to the County Council in the fall of 2006.

bicycling and walking areas along MacArthur Blvd. The plan includes an 8 ft-wide hiker-biker path, separated from the road by a 5 ft-wide green space and a 3 ft-wide “on-road” bike lane on each side of the roadway. The path will remain on the south side of MacArthur. The preliminary design covers the area between I-495 and Oberlin Ave. in Glen Echo. A couple of major engineering challenges have caused this phase

Mr. John Digiovanni, head of Highway Services Maintenance (240-777-7633) was contacted about numerous issues relating to the existing path and its maintenance needs and on January 30<sup>th</sup> they began addressing some of these. They are currently trimming overhanging vines and dead limbs and are expected to replace broken flex poles and the broken curbing around the circle in Glen Echo. They have indicated that they will be sweeping the path and clearing away trash and debris over the next several weeks.

Regarding the water drainage issues along MacArthur Blvd., Mr. Louis Machetto, of the Bethesda Department of Highway Services, is now fully aware of some of the more critical areas, such as the standing water at 77<sup>th</sup> and MacArthur. He has promised to do what he can as soon as possible. Any additional concerns can be addressed by calling 240-777-6000.

# Neighborhood News

**Eileen Martha Federer** entered the world in January. She is the daughter of **Eric and Daphne Federer** and sister of 3-year-old **Julia Sarah**. The Federers live on 77th Street.

Several long-time Cabin Johners have died recently. **Loretta Tuohey Hall** died in Centreville MD at age 90. Loretta, the last of the Tuoheys, was born in the family home in Cabin John (our house on 79th Street!) and grew up here. Her family ran Tuohey's Tavern where the shopping center is now. The Tuohey family donated the land for the Cabin John firehouse and Loretta started the Ladies Auxiliary of the CJ Volunteer Fire Department. Before she moved to Centreville, Loretta lived for many years in Garrett Park. She was the sister of **Gordon, Norman, and Kenneth Tuohey**, and **Ruth Tuohey Shuff** (all of whom are deceased), and the mother of **Ruth Hall** and **Jesse Crook** (who was also born in the same house). Jesse used to deliver *The Washington Post* to all of Cabin John, and he worked with Pete Prather in Dickenson's Grocery (now Captain's Market). He lives in Denton MD where he runs a bed and breakfast.

**Ralph Titus** died last month. Ralph was a third generation Cabin Johner. He grew up on 78th Street., and was a sheet metal worker. Ralph lived for many years in Salisbury on the Eastern Shore with his wife, **Sarah Davis Titus**. His parents were **Genevieve and Ralph Titus**, his sisters are **Millie Ransome** of Roanoke, and **Linda Johnson** of Gaithersburg. His daughter **Jennifer Titus** is in Gaithersburg; his son **James Titus** is in Augusta, WV. He had three grandchildren.

Another lifetime resident of Cabin John, **Albert Shoemaker** of 76th Street has died. Albert was a Navy veteran who was stationed for part of his military service in Antarctica. He worked as a painter. His brothers are **Norman (Buck) Shoemaker** of Cabin John, **Marvin Shoemaker** of Brookmont, and the late **Jesse Shoemaker**. His parents were **Nannie and Jesse Shoemaker**.

**Mara Clawson**, 12, daughter of **Michelle Marks and Lance Clawson**, was profiled in the February issue of *BabagaNewz*, a national classroom magazine for Jewish students. Born with a genetic disorder which makes it difficult

for her to express herself in words, Mara decided for her bat mitzvah to express her d'var torah in pastel drawings. She is now selling her drawings to raise funds for FD Hope, an organization dedicated to finding treatment for Familial Dysautonomia. The Clawsons live on 75th Street.

**Marjie Craig**, who lived on Arden Road for over 50 years, has moved to Asbury Methodist community in Gaithersburg. Marjie and her late husband, **Jim Craig**, raised six children here and were active in the community, including the Clara Barton PTA.



# CJCA News

*The next meeting of the CJCA will be Feb. 28, 7:30 pm at the Clara Barton Community Center.*

**Next CJCA Meeting Agenda**—1) CJCA participation in effort by Glen Echo Heights to develop/promote “tree save” legislation, 2) development of official CJCA position on proposed expansion of I-95 Beltway, and 3) possible co-sponsoring of community wine tasting event with Bethesda Co-op.

**Summary of January 24, 2006 CJCA Meeting**—1) The attendees discussed briefly various ways in which to recognize Diane Leatherman’s contributions to the community and agreed to ask Diane’s family for their thoughts first. 2) CJ resident Steve Cash gave a presentation on the draft request for information to go to companies regarding wireless internet access in CJ. The attendees approved sending out the request recognizing that the actual vote on whether to pursue such a system would take place in the future. Attendees expressed their desire that any such system not involve obvious/ugly antennae. 3) CJ resident Susan Roberts gave a presentation on the status of the County’s efforts to improve the shared use/bike path along MacArthur Blvd. See the description elsewhere in this edition. 4) A motion was passed unanimously to recognize the contributions that CJ resident Andy Rice (our community’s historian) has made to the CJ community.

**Results of Cabin John’s Bingo Night**—The Bingo Night held at the Clara Barton Community Center (CBCC) in January was a big hit, in part because it had been a couple years since Bingo was last seen officially in Cabin John. The event netted \$200 to support programs at CBCC, but more importantly everyone came away a winner. No, really, everyone won something. The last game of the evening in particular required that the entire card be crossed out. The game kept going until everyone was done and had come up to the prize table to get something. The idea was implemented by the Bingo numbers caller extraordinaire Roger Berliner (who

also happens to be a declared Democratic candidate to represent our district on the County Council). The numbers caller for the first half of the evening was Carlotta Anderson, editor of the Glen Echo newsletter. The prizes for kids came with a Mardi Gras theme; the adults chose from an assortment of wines and items that were donated by various Cabin Johners, including Patricia Ammerman, Donna Zeigfinger, and others. Other volunteers included Dominique Maggio (Bingo card seller), Marcy Harrison, Bruce Wilmarth (money guy), Leslie Barden, Missy Rabner & Terry Fuller (food/drinks table), the Rabners who provided the sound system/loudspeaker for the event, and Trudy Nicholson. Also, many thanks to the CBCC staff who helped: Maura, Alexandra, Ben, Dave, Felicia, and Frank.

**Results of Feb 5, 2006 Cabin John Blood Drive**—Once again, Cabin John and other local communities responded to the urgent need for blood donors. We made the 50-pint goal/level right on the nose, thanks to the 61 people (mostly Cabin Johners) who showed up and signed in. We don’t list the donors for privacy reasons, but we do thank the volunteers: Karen Melchar and Lisan Cash lined up the donors, who by and large signed up on their own electronically once notified of the blood drive. Other volunteers who staffed the sign-in table included Judy, Andrew & David Brookes, Deborah and Andrew Beers, Benno Schmidt, and Heidi Brown Lewis. Burr Gray obtained refreshments, lunch for the Red Cross personnel, and way too many reading materials. Donors walked away more knowledgeable in esoteric areas as a result of their reading along with a free Red Cross tote bag. With this effort, the CJ blood drives, which were begun five years ago, crossed the 600-pint level in terms of blood collected. Once again, many thanks to those who continue to respond to this important of civic responsibility. —

## Kathleen Black — Seriously Fun

When I talked with Kathleen Black at her home on 75th Street on a starry January evening, her sons were about to go upstairs to hear their dad read another chapter of *Treasure Island*. Their dog Angus Black observed the interview between bites of a chew toy.

Before going upstairs, Charlie (11) and Liam (8) each made a point of asking their mom about her hockey event. She had been to the MCI Center on a last minute invitation to an autograph session with the Caps team. Kathleen is more than a fan. She plays ice hockey twice a week on teams under the nickname of “Q.” Rinks are sometimes in Reston and Fairfax City. Her sons think it is cool.

Perhaps being born in Iowa and spending a childhood in Toronto influenced her choice of sport. But the self-described “corporate brat” lived other places too, including Texas and DC while a student at George Washington University. She studied business and Russian. Kathleen pointed out a recent episode where this geographically diverse childhood came in handy. At the office of Congressman Sam Johnson where she works on tax, social security, and pension issues, the receptionist slot is now empty. All staff answer all phones for the time being. Having spent some time there, Kathleen can quickly pick up the phone and switch to “Texas talk,” making any constituent feel right at home. Her retired parents live in Congressman Johnson’s district.

Cabin John has been the Black family home for almost ten years. They lived in a townhouse in SW DC for six years. But they felt that their neighbors there were “garage door people”—opening garages to let themselves in and out but staying isolated from the community. They had three different sets of friends in Cabin John, including Liam’s godparents Karen Melchar and Benno Schmidt, when they started to look for a new home. It just made sense to find a house near where their friends were clustered, so she and husband Tom looked for any house for sale within walking distance for about a year before they bought. Since then, they’ve recruited other friends to the neighborhood.

Kathleen spoke appreciatively about the sense of community here in CJ. On a pretty day it can take her a half hour to walk around the block—so many folks to chat with. Recently her visiting mother accompanied her on this route and concluded “Who DON’T you know here?” Kathleen values CJ as a place where the

community sticks together in good and bad times and people step up to make things happen. She was especially thankful for the many kind, creative and unselfish gestures during her goddaughter Clare Schmidt’s battle with cancer. “It is remarkable that we’ve got such a great small town inside the DC beltway.”

Her commitment to CJ is reflected in her real estate plan: she saw her 75th Street home as a “carry out” house (i.e.

she will stay until they carry her out to a nursing home). This didn’t exactly come to pass. On the same day they received the architect’s plans for expanding their home, neighbors two doors down announced that they were putting their home on the market. The decision was rather easy...live through construction or move to a bigger house with a basement and creek views. It was even on the same school bus stop! So instead of #6524, #6528 is the carry out house.



Finally, “Q” spoke about how her hockey playing helps her as a Mom. It’s fun, it’s exercise and it helps to role model for their sons’ sports. You fall down, you goof up—it happens to all of us. Just get up and try again. —

# Looking Back in Cabin John

## Cabin John: Always an Active Community

As regular readers know, from time to time I like to refresh my memory by going to the back issues of the *Village News* and reminding myself of what was happening in our town in milestone years past.

For instance, 35 years ago in March 1971, Cabin Johners were deeply engaged in developing a community plan for the future development of Cabin John. A questionnaire had been developed by a Citizens Association committee—on what kind of facilities and services were desired—and was coming up for discussion at a town meeting on March 2. The process of community involvement continued for several months thereafter—some 234 families responded to the questionnaire—and the outcome was the community plan which in fact has guided our community’s development ever since and is enshrined in the County’s master plan for the Bethesda/Chevy Chase region. The active participation by citizens in shaping this plan for future community development has often been cited as an example of the democratic process at its best.



Five years later, in March 1976, the town was beginning to plan for what turned out to be the largest event in the community’s history—the all-day celebration of our country’s Bicentennial coming up in June, with a practically continuous

schedule of indoor and outdoor activities for young and old. But agitating citizens more immediately was the continued blockage of the Union Arch Bridge which had been closed to traffic for more than a year as various jurisdictions fought over who would pay for its repair after one of the facing stones

fell off and crashed on the parkway below the previous year. A representative of Congressman Gilbert Gude’s office, speaking at a citizens meeting in late January, declared it “the most bureaucratic tangle I’ve ever seen.” (It was not until December 1976 that the bridge finally re-opened.)

A glance at the news 20 years ago shows a varied agenda. Some of it seems very familiar; the Citizens Association meeting was to be devoted to safety on MacArthur Boulevard, with discussion on potholes, condition of the bike path, inadequate crosswalks, illegally parked cars, and dangers to children waiting for school busses. But many changes were reported too. One was the fundraising campaign for the Linda Billings memorial bench which sits today the entrance to the Union Arch Bridge. (Linda was a community leader who had been murdered by a thief in her government office while she was working late on Thanksgiving eve.) Another item was the report that the Quick Food Shop (known for many preceding years as the “Good ‘n’ Quick”) had been sold and would henceforth be known as the Captain’s Market. A report from Glen Echo revealed that the remodeling of Trav’s tavern—long a popular nearby beer joint which had been sold earlier to become a family style restaurant (and is now the Irish Inn at Glen Echo) — was being held up by a dispute with the Town of Glen Echo about the leasing of town land to become the restaurant’s parking lot.

In March 1991 our community was involved in negotiations with the owners of the MacArthur Square Shopping Center regarding a second building they wanted to build and which the Bethesda Co-op, then located adjacent to the Post Office, wanted to occupy. Citizens were particularly concerned that the new structure conform with the community plan and that no variances be allowed when a building permit was issued. And 10 years ago, a major topic was community support for the rebuilding of the C & O Canal towpath that had been severely damaged by heavy flooding in January.

Different concerns at different times but one thing is evident from this brief review: Cabin John has always been an active community. That’s one of the reasons why it’s such a great place to live. —


